What is OTR?

The Old Timers Reunion (OTR) is the largest gathering of cavers in the world. We meet annually over Labor Day weekend right here in our campground in Dailey to recount old friendships, develop new relationships with other cavers and to explore new boundaries of social life outside of the cave.

OTR started in 1950 and have met every year since, except during the COVID-19 pandemic of 2020 and 2021. Attendance has grown as high as 2,400 people for our 50th reunion in 1999. We now average around 1,500 members and guests.

The first 'O'ficial' Old Timers Reunion was held on Labor Day, 1950, at the Worden Hotel in Davis, West Virginia. Besides providing the opportunity for caving in the area, the event was organized to honor Felix Robinson. Forty-five cavers were in attendance and history had them visit eight caves over the weekend.

The Road Home

On December 30, 1970, twenty-eight year old John Denver got a five minute standing ovation at *The Cellar Door* in the Georgetown neighborhood of Washington DC for the first performance of *Take Me Home, Country Roads*. Denver, Bill Danoff, and Taffy Nivert recorded it in January and on August 18 it was certified Gold. Since 1972 it has been played at every WVU home game and is one of the state's official anthems. "The radio reminds me of my home far away" references the *Saturday Night Jamboree* on WWVA out of Wheeling, one of the few non-preacher, late night AM stations that late night travelers could hear back in the day. And in 1971, along with a couple of hundred cavers, the song took over McCoy's Mill.

It was as close to a religious experience as the Old Timers Reunion had ever seen. Everyone knew the words, and we sang with tears in our eyes. Over and over again. It was so unifying and so moving that there had to be more. It was the dawn of the 70's, and in the smoke and mirrors of the best caver party of the year all things were possible. We would write to John Denver and tell him about OTR. Surely he would come to the Mill. He would love to get high and party with so many kindred spirits. We had no idea that the song had originally been inspired by a drive through Maryland, or that early drafts had been about Massachusetts. That was irrelevant. We realized that Denver had created an anthem just for cavers, a sound track for the rest our lives. Fifty years later, driving down these country roads to OTR remains almost heaven.
