The Event Tent with Dave Field by Joel Jacobs

C&H: Tell me about the Event Tent and who uses it.

Dave: It was a Sarah Mosberg idea, when she was OTR chair, to have a place set aside for people to make presentations. They wanted to get away from the pavilion and out of the campground. Any of the conservancies, grottos who have a project, cave photographers. We help people who need a space to organize.

C&H: How do you register or schedule?

Dave: You can go onto the OTR website and schedule online; a half hour, an hour or more. It opens up in May or June.

C&H: What do you offer?

Dave: I have a computer and a sound system. If there are audio-visual needs, I do it. People usually use a flash drive. We had a great party for the OTR virgins. The 1950 people met here. Others have access to it. We've gotten a little better each year. At the end we have to break it all down and store it.

PAG Celebrates its 40th! It was March 1984 and "Nice Bob" Addis had just moved to Parkersburg, WV. He gathered as many local cavers as he could find in the *NSS Members Manual* in his living room and the Parkersburg Grotto (later renamed the Parkersburg Area Grotto) was born. What followed has been 40 years of fun, exploration, adventure, discovery, and camaraderie. On this, the 40th anniversary of the founding of the grotto, few of the original

The Contest Connection by Sharon Brinkman-Windle, Continued from yesterday

Each Speleo-Olympic contest relies on the expertise and commitment of experienced cavers. Here are some of our volunteers willing to be interviewed.

Gretchen "Red" Schock started caving in 1985, is a member of Seven Valleys Grotto, and has attended 33 OTRs. Her favorite contest memories were watching her niece Miranda doing the obstacle course as a toddler or watching Spider overcome physical challenges doing the vertical contest. "We should all give back. It wouldn't happen without so many volunteers."

Miranda Schock judges the 5k early morning run, the Scavenger Hunt, and the Poster Contest. She has been caving most of her life, about 26 years. Her primary grotto is also Seven Valleys and she has attended 25 OTRs. Her funniest contest memory was while doing the cable ladder, her belayer got distracted, and she was stuck at the top of the ladder because they didn't release the rope. She volunteers because "It's just what my family does."

Ziggy Seager has supervised the Vertical Contests for years, supported by the Seven Valleys Grotto. He started after he began caving in 1968. He has attended 28 OTRs. His favorite memory is watching the kids do rope. He volunteers because as he says, "Somebody's got to! I know about vertical, want to see it done safely, and everyone has a good time."

Tisha Springer judges the Cave Pack Contest. She has been caving since 1989, her primary grotto is WVACS, and has attended 27 OTRs. She has two favorite memories. First, winning the cable ladder contest while 6 months pregnant with her first child. Second, failing at the vertical contest after she was paralyzed, but getting special recognition for her efforts. She volunteers because contests are an important part of OTR. "It is a great way to get kids interested in the physical aspects of caving, improves their abilities, and helps them become safer cavers."

The Shades of Old Timers ajk 2024

Years ago, we took the kids to the Gettysburg Battlefield. It was a fine summer day but there was a chill, a breath of the spiritual power of the place, the still presence of the fallen. General Eisenhower had a farm in the middle of the battlefield, I suspect because he found solace there. At OTR one might sense a similar connection. How many of us are here? For a meaningful count, add to the registered attendance the long list of our fallen compadres. Anywhere from 40% to 60% of Americans are said to believe in ghosts, and 1 in 10 claims to have interacted with them. At OTR it might be closer to 100%. The difference between us and the ghosts is that the ghosts get in without paying.

What's Up? (8/30/24) by Joel Jacobs

Polaris is the North Star, the alpha star in the constellation Ursa Minor, the little bear. This white star, the 47th in brightness, is about 433 light years from Earth. It is the pole star. Every other star in our skies revolves around it. Find it by imagining a line extending away from the two stars at the end of the big dipper. If you look for it every night at the same time throughout the year, and note the positions of the circumpolar constellations, you will prove to yourself that it is the one star that does not move in the vast dome of night.
